Gary Moore's Recommended Sites to See

FIRST & FOREMOST: NEVER BE AFRAID TO TURN BACK. STAY SAFE! EVEN IF YOU CAN'T HIKE, CANOE, ETC GET OUT ANYWAYS. THERE ARE LOTS OF PLACES TO DRIVE AND SEE NATURE'S BEAUTY.

As great as GPS navigation is, we know it doesn't always work well around here. A paper map doesn't need a good connection and you'll likely find more places to see.

<u>Pittsburg, NH</u>: Many places to explore here, by logging road, on foot, bike & by canoe/kayak East Inlet, Scott Bog, Big Brook Bog, Boundary Pond, Indian Stream

<u>Garfield Falls</u> – take Magalloway Road Fourth CT "Lake" – trail leaves from NH Customs

<u>Upper CT River</u> has great fishing If you have a passport, can cross into Chartiersville (pronounced Shot See Ville) and check out Magnetic Hill.

<u>Beaver Brook Falls</u> on Rt 145 between Colebrook and Pittsburg Coleman State Park, Stewartstown

Dixville Notch State Park Table Rock is a relatively easy hike

Mt. Waumbek, Jefferson, NH

Lake Umbagog National Wildlife Refuge

<u>Grafton Notch State Park</u> – Newry, ME. Roadside locales like Screw Auger Falls, Mother Walker Falls, Moose Cave, Spruce Meadow Campground. There are other trails in the area for more serious hiking.
